Hato Fellow Tribal Citizens,

One day it is warm inviting us to go outside, work or play outdoors, enjoy the sunshine only for the temperatures to drop that night and we don our sweaters, jackets, or layered clothing once again. But in both extremes, we have been maskless. What a wonderful feeling! Yes, we realize COVID could return, obviously hoping it does not, but for now we kick our heels up and relish in our blessings of being COVID free. The one constant we seem to have has been the wind. It blows and blows, sometimes fiercely. Yes, tornado watches are coming more frequently now that we are ending April and beginning May. Plus we have had quite a bit of rain lately. All of that seems minor compared to being rid of COVID, at least temporarily.

Plus we were blessed with the presence of none other than the Easter Bunny! We couldn't do events like this without our faithful volunteers. Special thanks to the CCDF for funding the event, to the Learning Center for helping to host the event, to those who stuffed the eggs with candy and prizes, to those who hid the eggs and to those who were willing to help with the myriad of details, including bounce houses. We'll do it all again next year and see how much each kiddo has grown in a year's time. Until then kids, keep smilin'.

nine tribes who live here. Michael Daugherty, who wrote and illustrated, Koko's Secret Treasure, has turned it into a delightful short film. Some of the other videos are, Sap Suckers - A Brief History of Oklahoma Sugar, Finding Hope in Horses, A Piece that was Missing and Circle of Cedars, a music video. Other topics cover food, pottery, poetry, beading, water, language and more.

Some of the comments at this writing include, "Exceptionally moving and meaningful, beautiful videography, people, music and sounds. Celebrate what you all have created," Mary Howell, Norfolk, Virginia. "What came through all of it was a beautiful connection to the Spirit within and without, a great love of family and friends and a way of cherishing life and its many aspects," Julie Russell, Nashville, Tennessee. "So great to hear the stories in their own words," Paul Mougey, Grand Junction, Michigan. "My heart is so

full from watching all these – these are treasures for me, our people, and our children! I cannot express how deeply grateful I feel. Tizameh, thank you so very much," Cyd West, Arizona

Changes recently made to Election Ordinance Below is the list of changes that were made: Submitted by James Sullivan, Election Board Chairman

- Any member of the Election Board who misses three (3) consecutive meetings of the Election Board shall automatically be considered by the Chairperson of the Election Board to have resigned their position.
- A quorum shall consist of four (4) members of the Election Board
- The filing period for candidacy shall be the first Monday of June to the following Friday excluding holidays recognized by the Tribal Administration.
- No later than May 1st, the Election Board Secretary shall cause to be published an Election Notice

- in the Shooting Star Newspaper
- In the event that a majority of the Business Committee positions are vacant due to death or resignation, and a quorum cannot be established the Election Board shall be empowered to call a Special Election. The Special Election shall be conducted by secret ballot using procedures herein described by this Election Ordinance.
- If a vacancy occurs in any elected office, the following procedure shall be followed: If the vacancy occurs in the office of the Chief, the Second Chief shall immediately succeed the Chief. If the

vacancy occurs in any position of the Business Committee, the Business Committee shall call a special election within sixty (60) days to fill such elected office. If vacancies occur in the Offices of the Chief and the Second Chief and the Treasurer is serving as Acting Chief, pursuant to Article VII, Section 4 of the Constitution of the Eastern Shawnee Tribe of Oklahoma, ratified April 4, 1994, the Business Committee shall call for a Special Election as outlined in the Constitution and this Election Ordinance.

FROM THIS CORNER

One month ago in the last week of March I drove to Ohio for a series of presentations I made at the Ohio University at Chillicothe and Hopewell Culture National Historical Park located nearby. Accompanying me was my friend Judy Haas-Smith who lives in nearby Neosho, MO. Judy writes a weekly article for the Newton County News Dispatch and is sometimes featured in the River Hills Traveler, both owned by Jimmy Sexton of Neosho. With the recent completion and submission to Paris, France of the World Heritage designation), the Eastern Shawnee Tribe being the sponsoring tribe of this historical nomination, and March being Women's History month, I was asked to combine the three elements in my presentations. Quite the challenge I must say. I reviewed the mounds nominated, spoke of how I became involved and elaborated on leadership traits of Native American female leaders, highlighting Nonhelema and Tecumapease (Shawnee leaders) along with Sacagawea and Wilma Mankiller. Since Judy had never seen any of the mounds in Ohio, we visited Serpent Mound, Tremper Mound and Mound City prior to the presentation at Ohio University in Chillicothe. Following is the article she wrote regarding her trip to Ohio.

TRAVELS WITH CHIEF BY JUDY HAAS-SMITH

This column is NOT a travelogue. It is a trip into history which has not been taught and which when learned is a reason for great National Pride mixed with some overdue National Regret.

This past week [last week in March] Eastern Shawnee Chief Glenna J. Wallace took me to a consortium meeting of likeminded organizations actively interested in the preservation of Indian history at the University of Ohio campus at Chillicothe, Ohio.

The topic of this meeting was a report of their efforts to have certain Ohio mound sites listed with the UNESCO World Heritage Sites group which operates in Paris, France.

The application for this designation is now formally submitted and the holdup is that one of the sites, named Newark Earthwork Mounds, has a 99-year lease for a golf course on top of the site.

To put this in terms you might readily identify with, SUP-POSE Russia or China somehow took over the U.S.A. and bull-dozed Arlington National Cemetery.

You may know that I am a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution and also a member of the Colonial Dames XVII Century. This means I can prove my ancestors on my mother's side came to the North American Continent in the 1600s.

That is well before the Revolution of 1776. Their arrival date at Jamestown was 1635 on the good ship, AMERICA. They went 35 miles upstream and farmed there.

They had to be in the vicinity of native peoples. Over the years of their constantly moving westward into Missouri, there is no mention of any trouble with the First American Native indigenous peoples.

Eastern Woodland Indians are those tribes east of the Mis-

sissippi River. Western Indians are more usually called the Plains Indians.

When I became aware of the paintings of the Eastern Woodland Indians, I was instantly interested in being able to look at the people and landscape of my own ancestors' adventures. I am grateful to local artist Doug Hall for this. His attention to detail about the period clothing, implements, habits and lifestyle is import to me personally.

To my knowledge I have no Indian ancestors but I now have an Indian friend, Chief Glenna, and I have learned the cause for which she is devoting lots of energy and efforts.

I have always had an interest in early peoples and their cultures, such as the Vikings, Egyptians, Aztecs and Mayans. Those peoples have been the subject of many serious studies by professional archeologists and anthropologists.

Based on the era known as the Age of Exploration, United States students have been taught historical developments in exploring and colonizing the "New World" found in the 1400's. I think the chance to teach about societies built and using lots of gold was probably thought to hold students' interests more than subjects of agriculture and social cooperation.

Now, more is known.

I can tell I am beginning to think of these weekly articles as a classroom column. You readers are my students. I want to assign you some recent textbooks for learning what you had no way to learn earlier in life.

My favorite text at the moment is "1491: New Revelations About the Americas before Columbus" by Charles C. Mann. It is already in its second edition, and I can hardly put it down. However, I got a crash course this past week in the trip to southern Ohio with Chief Glenna. Columbus, Chillicothe and

Hillsboro is the area from which the Shawnee were removed from their homeland by the enforcement of the Removal Act of 1830.

They were promised 60,000 acres of Indian Territory in exchange for leaving Ohio. As colonists were moving into their area anyway, they agreed to move.

In 1832, they walked the whole way to Indian Territory into what is now Ottawa County. The Eastern Shawnee are named "Eastern" by the Federal Government because they are from the eastern area of Ohio and Ottawa County is located in northeast Oklahoma. There are two other federally recognized tribes also from Ohio.

It is just now coming to light and recognition how much of their history got left behind along with the remains of their ancestors who lived in Ohio back as far as 2000 years BCE (Before the Common Era).

A lot of this information is based on the proof of human existence by the construction of what are called Earthworks or Mounds. The complexity of these "in-ground "sites raises the opinion of these ancient peoples from "savages to geniuses." Their understanding of complex geometry and earthen architecture as well as astronomy has not until now been fully understood.

If you are looking for an educational, inspiring, and historical trip to take, go to Ohio. Chief Glenna J. Wallace visited the area for the first time in 2007 and became aware of the birth pangs of saving remnants of Native American culture.

She became a spokesperson and promoter of this project for her people. She has connected and supported the Ohio Historical Connection and a group known as ARC of Appalachia, which is a private conservation group also protecting and supporting the mounds' existence.

Universities in the area are reportedly in competition for further exploration and findings. Eight of these ancient American Indian monuments have been submitted to UNESCO as proposed World Heritage sites. They are a grouping in eastern Ohio known as Hopewell Ceremonial Earthworks.

Just as the tombs of Egypt held objects of that ancient culture, so do these. I was first taken to view Serpent Mound. This was first found in 1850. It measures 1,300 feet including the convolutions and it is 20 feet wide.

The next place I was taken was to the National Park Service visitor's center at Chillicothe, Ohio, where the meetings began.

It was really inspiring to see the National Park Service Rangers and the other actors included in this push to protect the findings of this ancient culture and they all paid homage to Chief Glenna Wallace.

I was especially delighted to see that the local DAR had gone to the trouble to set up and recruit members and board members for a Friends of the Hopewell Culture.

They also put out a pamphlet about helping people find their own Native American Patriot. Indians fought in the Revolution as well as the Civil War.

And I must admit that to tell you more in this small column space requires a pamphlet. Perhaps I will do a short series explaining each of the eight sites.

You also could check out the Internet information: start with the Ancient Ohio Trail and a 120 page guide (PDF) is available for download.

We have come a long way from chalk on blackboard. I, for one, have always thought ancient people had brilliance which preceded technology as we know it.

We now are finding that the ancient cultures we were taught in school curriculums are now having to be updated for the Ancient American Culture.

We are the stewards responsible.

Second Covid-19 Booster shots now available!

GUIDELINES ARE AS FOLLOWS:

MODERNA:

- 1. Immunocompromised 18 y/o and older: second booster 4months after most recent dose.
- Non-immunocompromised 50
 Y/O and older: second booster 4
 months after most recent dose.

PFIZER:

1. Immunocompromised 12 y/o and older: second booster 4 months after most recent dose.

2. Non-immunocompromised 50 y/o and older: second booster 4 months after most recent dose.

JOHNSON & JOHNSON:

- 1. Pfizer or Moderna recommended for boosters.
- 2. Immunocompromised 18 y/o and older: second booster 2 months after most recent dose.
- 3. Non-immunocompromised 50 y/o and older: second booster 2 months after most recent dose.

Boosters are not recommended at this time for anyone under 12 y/o.

INTER-TRIBAL COUNCIL FOOD DISTRIBUTION

We are a federal program that provides commodity foods to low-income households residing in approved areas. To be eligible to participate, the household must contain at least one person who is a member of a federally recognized tribe. Eligible households are certified based upon income and resource standards act by the federal government.

The area served by the Inter-Tribal Food Distribution Program is a portion of Ottawa, including the city limits of Miami east of Neosho River and a portion of Delaware county in Oklahoma. Cherokee and Labette Counties in Kansas, Newton, Barton, Jasper and McDonald counties in Missouri.

Emergency Rental Assistance Program By Shelly Rogers, Executive Administration Assistant

The purpose of the Eastern Shawnee Tribe of Oklahoma Emergency Rental Assistance Program is to provide direct financial assistance, including rent, rental arrears, utilities and home energy costs, utilities and home energy costs arrears, and other expenses related to housing. This program will make available a limited amount of assistance to households that are unable to pay rent and utilities due to the COVID-19 pandemic. This program will serve eligible households and is subject to available program funding.

Eligibility:

- Qualifies for unemployment or has experienced a reduction in household income, incurred significant costs, or experienced a financial hardship due, directly or indirectly, to the Covid-19 outbreak.
- Demonstrates a risk of experiencing homelessness (rent) or housing instability (utilities and other expenses); and



EMERGENCY RENTAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Has a household income at or below 80 percent of your area median (FY 2020).

Assistance Provided:

- 1. Rent
- 2. Rental arrears
- Utilities (electric, gas, water and sewer, fuel oil)
- 4. Utility arrears
- 5. Internet

Eligible households may apply and receive up to three months of assistance at a time, provided funds are available. A maximum of 12 months assistance or \$3,000, whichever should come first.

Sedatives and their dangers

Sedatives are a prescription medication and a controlled substance that can be used to help you feel more relaxed and sleep. They are prescribed for anxiety and sleep disorders though sedatives have also used them as a general anesthetic. Sedatives are regulated as they can be highly addictive and can cause people to become dependent upon them.

Sedatives modify certain nerve communications within your central nervous system and your brain. It this modification that helps you to relax and slows your brain activity. Sedatives target the neurotransmitter known as GABA or gamma-aminobutyric acid. This neurotransmitter is responsible for slowing down your brain and by increasing it in your central nervous system, the sedative allows GABA to produce a stronger effect on your brain activity. Sedatives include Benzodiazepines, Barbiturates, Hypnotics, and Opioids. Some of the more common drugs in these categories include Xanax, Valium, Luminal, Ambien, Vicodin, OxyContin, and Percocet. These treat a variety of symptoms including anxiety, panic disorders, sleep disorders, anesthesia, and pain.

Like any prescription medication sedatives can have long term and shortterm side effects. Short term side ef-



fects can include sleepiness, dizziness, blurred vision, impaired vision, slow reaction, slow breathing, and slurring. Long term effects include amnesia, depression, increased anxiety, liver damage and addiction to the sedative which can lead to withdrawal or irreversible effects if taken suddenly.

When one's body becomes physically dependent on the sedative and cannot function normally unless on the sedative is called dependency or addiction, examples of dependency include feeling like your unable to stop taking the sedative or higher doses are needed to achieve the same effect. If you stop tak-

ing the sedative and experience the following symptoms, you could be suffering from withdrawal. These symptoms include increased anxiety, irritability, inability to sleep, feeling nauseous or seizures. If your taking sedatives and have any of these symptoms, contact your physician for assistance.

12 Benefits of Walking

March 20th was the first day of Spring in 2022. On Friday, March 25th, the Wellness Center hosted the Step into Spring Walk. The Walk included walking a mile around our indoor track and reading posters on why you should walk every day. Throughout the day, we had 93 participants walk around our indoor track and receive a spring t-shirt.

Twelve Benefits of Walking. What's not to like about walking? It's free. It's easy to do, and it's easy on the joints. And there's no question that walking is good for you. It lowers the risk of blood clots, since the calf acts as a venous pump, contracting and pumping blood from the feet and legs back to the heart, reducing the load on the heart. In addition to being an easy aerobic exercise, walking is good for you in many other ways.

1. The Benefits of Walking

Improve Circulation -Walking wards off heart disease, brings up the heart rate, lowers blood pressure and strengthens the heart. Post-menopausal women who walk just one to two miles a day can lower their blood pressure by nearly 11 points in 24 weeks. Women who walk 30 minutes a day can reduce their risk of stroke by 20%, and by 40% when they stepped up the pace, according to researchers at the Harvard School of Public Health in Boston.

2. Shore Up Your Bones

Walking can stop the loss of bone mass for those with osteoporosis, according to Michael A. Schwartz, MD, of Plancher Orthopedics & Sports Medicine in New York. In fact, one study of post-menopausal women found that 30 minutes of walking each day reduced their risk of hip fractures by 40%.

3. Enjoy a Longer Life

Research finds that people who exercise regularly in their fifties and sixties are 35% less likely to die over the next eight years than their non-walking coun-

terparts. That number shoots up to 45% less likely for those who have underlying health conditions.

4. Lighten Your Mood

Walking releases natural pain—killing endorphins to the body – one of the emotional benefits of exercise. A California State University, Long Beach, study showed that the more steps people took during the day, the better their moods were.

5. Lose Weight

A brisk 30-minute walk burns 200 calories. Over time, calories burned can lead to pounds dropped.

6. Strengthen Muscles

Walking tones your leg and abdominal muscles – and even arm muscles if you pump them as you walk. This increases your range of motion, shifting the pressure and weight from your joints to your muscles.

7. Improve Sleep

Studies found that women, ages 50 to 75, who took one-hour morning walks, were more likely to relieve insomnia than women who didn't walk

8. Support Your Joints

Most of the joint cartilage has no direct blood supply. It gets its nutrition from joint fluid that circulates as we move. Movement and compression from walking "squishes" the cartilage, bringing oxygen and nutrients into the area.

9. Improve Your Breath

When walking, your breathing rate increases, causing oxygen to travel faster through bloodstream, helping to eliminate waste products and improve your energy level and the ability to heal.

10. Slow Down Mental Decline

A study of 6,000 women, ages 65 and older, performed by researchers at the

University of California, San Francisco, found that age-related memory decline was lower in those who walked more. The women walking 2.5 miles per day had a 17% decline in memory, as opposed to a 25% decline in women who walked less than a half-mile per week.


11. Lower Alzheimer's Risk

A study from the University of Virginia Health System in Charlottesville found that men between the ages of 71 and 93 who walked more than a quarter of a mile per day had half the incidence of dementia and Alzheimer's disease than those who walked less.

12. Do More for Longer

Aerobic walking and resistance exercise programs may reduce the incidence of disability in the activities of daily living for people who are older than 65 and have symptomatic OA, a study published in the Journal of Clinical Outcomes Management found.

Program Update Hello all -

We hope this article finds everyone safe and well. We wanted to take time to remind everyone that our program provides services to ALL Eastern Shawnee current victims of crime, specifically domestic violence and sexual assault, **REGARD-LESS** of where they live. That means, if you live in Oklahoma, Oregon, Missouri, Kansas, or ANYWHERE and you are a current victim of crime...YOU ARE NOT ALONE. Below we will outline what that means and what services we provide.

HAVEN Assists All Eastern Shawnee Victims of Violence REGARDLESS of Where they Live

While we work specifically with victims of domestic violence and sexual assault, we also assist other victims of crime. Our program assists all Eastern Shawnee current victims of crime, meaning those who have been a victim of crime in the past 6 months with a copy of a police report.

Current Victim of Crime: Defined by Office for Victims of Crime

- · Adult molested as child
- Adult age 18 or older who was sexually abused as a child (see child sexual abuse definition below).
- Adult sexual assault
- Sexual offense—including rape, incest, fondling, exhibitionism, or pornography—of an adult age 18 or older.
- Aggravated assault
- Unlawful, intentional causing of serious bodily injury with or without a deadly weapon, or unlawful, intentional attempting or threatening of serious bodily injury or death with a deadly or dangerous weapon.
- Arson
- Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling, house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, or personal property of another.
- Assault
- An unlawful attack by one person on another, with or without a weapon, that inflicts, or attempts or threatens to inflict, physical injury.
- Child physical abuse
- Non-accidental injury to a child by a parent or other adult that may include severe beatings, burns, strangulation, or human bites.
- Child sexual abuse

- Sexual offense (see definition below) against a child by a parent or other adult.
- Domestic violence
- Violent acts involving a current or former spouse or domestic partner.
- DUI/DWI crash
- Accident involving one or more motor vehicles in which at least one driver was under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs (DUI) or was legally intoxicated (DWI) at the time of the crash.
- Elder abuse
- Abuse perpetrated by a caretaker on an elderly individual who depends on others for support and assistance.
- Fraud
- A deliberate deception perpetrated for unlawful or unfair gain.
- Human Trafficking
- Sex trafficking in which a commercial sex act is induced by force, fraud, or coercion, or in which the person induced to perform such act has not attained 18 years of age; or the recruitment, harboring, transportation, provision, or obtaining of a person for labor or services, through the use of force, fraud, or coercion, for the purpose of subjection to involuntary servitude, peonage, debt bondage, or slavery.
- Identity theft
- A crime in which an imposter obtains key pieces of personal information, such as Social Security or driver's license numbers, to impersonate someone else.
- Robbery
- Taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence.
- Sexual offense
- Forcible rape, attempted rape, statutory rape, sexual harassment, prostitution, or other unlawful sexual contact and other unlawful behavior intended to result in sexual gratification or profit from sexual activity.
- Stalking
- Any unwanted contact between two people that directly or indirectly communicates a threat or places the victim in fear.
- White-collar crime
- Nonviolent crime for financial gain committed by means of deception by persons with special technical and professional knowledge of business or government.
- For a complete list of OVC's definition of victims of crime please call our office.

Services We Provide: Emergency Services:

- Advocacy and emotional support, for the client and their children
- Emergency services such as transport to shelter and food or clothing and other emergency needs.

Services are determined by the client and advocate on a case-bycase basis of established need.

Participants in the Eastern Shawnee Haven program must be a CURRENT victim of domestic violence, sexual assault, stalking, teen dating violence, human sex trafficking or victim of crime. Eligibility based on need and assessment by Haven advocate.

- You must fill out a Summer Youth Program Application. These can be found on the ESTO website, as well as at the Tribal Administration/HR office.
- Applications must be filled out in their entirety, and submitted by May 16, 2022, at 4 p.m.
- Tribal membership will be verified with Vital Statistics, and a copy of a school schedule or proof of enrollment for the fall semester must be turned in with the application.
- You must be enrolled as full-time students for the next school year.
- The program will run from the first day after summer break begins until first day classes resume Earlier availability will be considered on a case-by-case-basis.
- We will accommodate summer camps, sports, vacations, etc. as much as we can.
- Our goal is to make department assignments based on personal interests (as much as possible) taking age restrictions and other limitations in to account as applicable.

- Assist in the greenhouse(s) as needed.

- Individual selections will be made based on the interview process and available positions.



Severe Weather Safety Tips

The spring storm season is upon us and has started out active with multiple severe weather events and even a few communities nearby experiencing major damage from tornados. Below are a few safety tips to make this storm season as safe as possible.

TORNADOS can strike without warning and destroy a community in seconds. Before a tornado warning is issued for your area, here are some things you should do:

- Know your community's and employer's warning system.
- Pick a place where family members can gather if a tornado is

- headed your way. It could be your basement, a center hallway, bathroom, or closet on the lowest floor. Keep this place uncluttered.
- If you are in a high-rise building and don't have enough time to go to the lowest floor, pick a place in a hallway in the center of the building.
- Remove diseased and damaged limbs from trees.
- Move or secure lawn furniture, trash cans, hanging plants or anything else that can be picked up by the wind and become a projectile.

LIGHTNING can be extremely dangerous too. Each year many people are injured and killed by lightning strikes. Here are the top lightning safety steps you should follow:

 If you can hear thunder, you are close enough to the storm to be struck by lightning. Go to a safe shelter immediately.

- As the storm approaches, take shelter in a building.
- If you are driving, stay in your vehicle with the windows closed and turn on the emergency flashers if you need to pull over. Avoid touching metal or other surfaces that conduct electricity in and outside of the vehicle.
- If you are inside, unplug appliances and avoid using land line telephones or any electrical appliances. Avoid taking a bath, shower, or running water for any other purpose.
- If you are caught outside and cannot reach a safe building avoid high ground, water towers, tall isolated trees, and metal objects such as fences or bleachers. Remember that picnic shelters, dugouts, and storage sheds are not safe locations during a thunderstorm.

ONE-LAYER FROSTED CARROT CAKE

Prep Time: 14 min., Cook Time: 45 min., Total Time: 60 Minutes, Servings 9

INGREDIENTS

- 1 ¼ cups all-purpose flour stirred before measuring
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 ½ teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- ¾ cup vegetable oil
- 2 large eggs room temperature
- 2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract
- 1 cup grated carrots
- 1 cup coarsely chopped walnuts
- ½ cup raisins, or coarsely chopped dates, optional

FOR THE FROSTING

- 1 (3 ounce) package cream cheese, room temperature
- 1 tablespoon warm water
- 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
- 3 cups confectioners' sugar, sifted

Directions

- Preheat oven to 325 f. grease an 8-or9-inch-square pan and set aside
- Measure flour and add to a large mixing bowl along with the sugar, baking powder, salt, cinnamon, oil, eggs, and vanilla
- Blend for 1 minute on low speed of electric mixer.

- 4. Stir in carrots, nuts and optional raisins or dates in batter.
- 5. Pour into prepared pan.
- Bake for 40 to 45 minutes until a wooden toothpick inserted in the center, comes out clean
- 7. Cool completely on a wire rack **Make the frosting**

Kids and Allergies

What Are Allergies?

Allergies are abnormal immune system reactions to things — known as allergens —that are typically harmless to most people. This causes symptoms that can range from just annoying to possibly life-threatening. Common allergens include some foods, dust, plant pollen, and medicines.

Many adults and kids have some type of allergy.

How Do Allergies Happen?

If a child with an allergy is exposed to that allergen, their immune system mistakenly believes it's harming their body. It overreacts, treating the substance as an invader and trying to fight it off. To protect the body, the immune system makes antibodies called immunoglobulin E (IgE). These cause certain cells to release chemicals (including histamine) into the bloodstream to defend against the allergen "invader."

It's the release of these chemicals that causes allergic reactions. Reactions can affect the eyes, nose, throat, lungs, skin, and gastrointestinal tract. Future exposure to that same allergen will trigger this allergic response again.

What Are the Kinds of Allergies? Common types of allergies include:

Airborne Allergies

These include:

- dust mites
- pollen (often called hay fever)
- molds
- pets
- cockroaches

Food Allergies

These are the top causes of food allergies in kids:

- cow's milk (or cow's milk protein)
- eggs
- fish
- shellfish
- peanuts and tree nuts
- sox
- wheat
- sesame

Other Common Allergies

- insect sting allergy
- medicines, such as antibiotics and some over-the-counter medicines
- chemicals. Some cosmetics or laundry detergents can make people break out in hives. Usually, this is because someone has a reaction to the chemicals in these products. Dyes, household cleaners, and pesticides also can cause allergic reactions in some people.

Why Do Kids Get Allergies?

The tendency to develop allergies is often hereditary, which means it can be passed down through genes from parents to their kids. But just because a parent has allergies doesn't mean that their kids definitely will get them. And someone usually doesn't inherit a particular allergy, just the likelihood of having allergies. Some kids have allergies even if no family member is allergic. Kids who are allergic to one thing often are allergic to others.

Some kids also have cross-reactions. For example, kids who are allergic to birch pollen might have symptoms when they eat an apple because that apple contains a protein similar to one in the pollen. And for reasons that aren't clear, people with a latex allergy (found in latex gloves and some kinds of hospital equipment) are more likely to be allergic to foods like kiwi, chestnuts, avocados, and bananas.

How Are Allergies Diagnosed?

If your child has cold-like symptoms lasting longer than a week or two or develops a "cold" at the same time every year, talk with your doctor, who might diagnose an allergy and prescribe medicines, or may refer you to an allergist (a doctor who diagnoses and treats allergies) for allergy tests.

To find the cause of an allergy, aller-

gists usually do skin tests for the most common environmental and food allergens. They might do blood tests instead for kids with skin conditions, who are on certain medicines, or who are very sensitive to a particular allergen.

Even if testing shows an allergy, a child also must have symptoms to be diagnosed with an allergy. So, a toddler who has a positive test for dust mites and sneezes a lot while playing on the floor would be considered allergic to dust mites.

How Are Allergies Treated?

There's no cure for allergies, but symptoms can be managed. The best way to cope with them is to avoid the allergens. Parents should talk to their kids often about the allergy itself and the reactions they can have if they consume or come into contact with the allergen.

Tell all caregivers (childcare staff, teachers, family members, parents of your child's friends, etc.) about your child's allergy.

If avoiding environmental allergens isn't possible or doesn't help, doctors might prescribe medicines, including antihistamines, eye drops, and nasal sprays. (Many also are available without a prescription.)

In some cases, doctors recommend

allergy shots (immunotherapy) to help desensitize a person to an allergen. But these are only helpful for allergens such as dust, mold, pollens, animals, and insect stings. They're not used for food allergies.

The Business Committee Meeting was called to order at 5:30 p.m. by 2nd Chief Chris Samples with the following answering roll call: 1st Council Gardner, 2nd Council Daugherty, 3rd Council Kraus and Treasurer Barrett. Chief Wallace and 2nd Chief Samples were present. Secretary Littlefield was absent. A Quorum was declared by 2nd Chief Samples.

NEW ENROLLEES

None Presented

MOTION: To take the agenda out of order at 5:32 p.m. Motion made by Treasurer Barrett with second by 1st Council Gardner for Housing Presentation.

Motion carried: 4 approved (Gardner, Daugherty, Kraus, Barrett), 0 opposed, 0 abstained, 1 absent (Littlefield). Housing Authority Presentation by Ben Dixon

Reporting on projects of the Housing Authority – A final bill from Asbell has been received with an additional charge on it that the Housing Authority would like the Business Committee to approve. Once this has been approved that project will be completed.

Reporting on the 12 new houses with the potential for 40 plus houses on the Oliver Property the Housing Authority wish to be able to have a playground built. Suggested location is up near the Police Department. The wish is for the playground to possibly have a water feature and possibly a walking track. The Housing Authority would like for the Tribe to be willing to offer this property up to that project as this is Trust Land.

Other projects – the trailer has been moved out and the first infrastructure piece has been completed. The issue with fence posts will be addressed soon and as soon as the weather is warmer

the repair to the rock façade to seal from moisture will be completed.

The IHBG ARPA Fund – ARPA money set aside by Housing for Clean Air. Will be using this money to test air quality in houses, clean air ducts and replace air conditioning filters. The financial side is ready to go, and we are looking for a Company to get out there and schedule with homeowners.

Request for Housing Authority to go into Closed Session with Business Committee made at this time.

MOTION: To go into Closed Session with the Housing Authority at 5:44 p.m. Motion made by Treasurer Barrett with second by 1st Council Gardner.

Following Closed Session, the following information was presented by Ben Dixon and the Housing Authority to address incorrect information presented at the February 23, 2022, BC meeting concerning the house with issues of mold. The Housing Authority had reached out to the EPA Department in Miami and had a third party come out to check on the issue. When the reports came back the EPA in Miami gave information on how to remediate the issue. Their findings and our own EPA Department provided almost the same reports. The process was started to get the remediation group out to the home and explain how the situation would be handled and the work would be scheduled at that point to do the remediation. The statements presented made it sound like nothing was being done, that it was being done incorrectly and that HUD would not approve. The Housing Authority was already in discussion with HUD and in direct

Communication with the Administrator of Southern Plains. The Administrator of Southern Plains indicated that it sounded like there was a plan in place, he was happy with the plan, and he wanted to consider his end of the situation resolved. The Housing Authority requests that when a homeowner has an issue to please come to the Housing Authority office to start the process of assistance. You should report your issues to the Housing Director, and you may also report to any Housing Board Member. After following this process, you may also report to the Business Committee if needed.

DONATION REQUEST: Eli Pritchard requested a donation to sponsor his upcoming Missouri Rodeo Season.

MOTION: To donate \$1,000.00 to Eli. Motion made by Treasurer Barrett with second by 2nd Council Daugherty.

Motion carried: 4 approved (Gardner, Daugherty, Kraus and Barrett), 0 opposed, 0 abstained, 1 absent (Littlefield).

DIRECTOR REPORTS: Provided to BC members. Chief Wallace suggested the Utility Assistance Emergency line item be monitored closely due to the high cost of propane and gas.

Chief's Wallace proposed hiring 2 additional employees for the maintenance

department as wood cutters to provide free wood to tribal members. This will be moved to the next meeting Agenda for discussion.

EMPIRE DISTRICT (Liberty) A letter was received in reference to 114 acres owned by 7 tribes across from Wyandotte Tribe. Empire District is seeking right of way for an easement to rebuild and maintain an electric line along the north side of Hwy 60. They provided an appraisal and offer of fair market value for our portion of land involved to the upgrade of the existing line. Their offer for 1.85 acres at \$3,450 per acres is \$6,583.00 divided by 7 tribes which would be \$911.00. Chief Wallace suggested a higher price and would like to discuss this with the ITC leaders. BC members agreed with her suggestion.

PARTICIPATION IN VOTE YOUR VALUES – A letter was received from Matthew Morgan encouraging Native Americans to be registered to vote. Only 32-34% of Native Americans are registered to vote. This program does not endorse candidates or parties. BC members agreed to participation.

ELDERS DINNER – Friday, April 28, 2022, at 5:30 p.m. at the AOA.

AOA remains closed this month. Tentative opening to the public will be the first Monday in April.

ECLC BIDS – Three bids were presented to put the pipe in and cover the ditch at the ECLC. The bids are \$53,250, 51,115, and \$46,082.50. Chief Wallace chose the lower bid and requested to continue the procurement process. No objections were given.

RENTAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM – This program does cover more than rental assistance but must be COVID related. The total amount made available to spend by the end of September is \$52,190.26. We have spent \$43,000.00 leaving \$9,129.43 to be spent. We can obtain more funds when this is spent, and those forms have been checked and submitted.

FOOD DISTRIBUTION PROGRAM-This program has grown from 54 families to 110 families served. Our monthly budget is \$10,000 and this last month we spend \$9,993.00.

PROPERTY FOR SALE – to be discussed in closed session.

GRANT UPDATES – 1938 Base Roll. Everyone on the roll at this time is listed with a picture beside their name. This grant has closed out.

Calamus Pond Grant – the Calamus Cemetery was established in 1832 and Graves in that cemetery will be identified and try to connect to the 1938 roll. SSBCI – stands for State Small Business Credit Initiative. Is due 5-11-22 is not written yet.

ICW Grant - a 5-year grant for \$600,000.00. This will be distributed at \$120,000.00 a year for the 5 years and is for Parents as Teachers. This grant is due in 3 weeks

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT GRANT – requires Business Committee direction.

LETTER FROM CHAIRMAN BYRD OF THE QUAPAW TRIBE – this was an unsolicited letter from the Chairman Byrd complimenting, our Behavioral Health Program.

OLD TOWN MUSEUM IN OHIO – Our own Talon Silverhorn has been named as Director of the museum. The state of Ohio and the Governor are very excited about this project. Originally this project was approved at 2 million, but it has been increased to 10-12 million and honors the three Shawnee tribes and Tecumseh. This museum is scheduled to be completed in approximately one year.

WORLD HERITAGE NOMINATION – Chief Wallace has been working on this project for 15 years and this is for the Mounds in Ohio. World Heritage means those places that have exceptional cultural value. This would be equal to the Pyramids in Egypt, the Great Wall of China, the Great Barrier Reef, the Coliseum in Rome, the Acropolis in Greece. The mounds that our forefathers made and worshiped at are as impressive as any of the places

mentioned. The nomination is completed and has been sent to World Heritage Headquarters in Paris, France. The nomination has been reviewed and they are impressed. This will take place in 2023 and our Tribe is the Sponsoring Tribe.

TINY HOMES: Work is being continued to get the Tiny Homes moved and Tracy is getting bids for having the homes moved.

COYOTE REPORT: Due to recent reports of sightings of coyote in the Housing area the Housing Authority is working with the Feral Hog Program to observe and eliminate this problem.

DARK COUNTY GREENVILLE, OHIO TRAIL OF ART INVITATION: This invitation is extended to the Business Committee. All three Shawnee tribes have been invited to this event to be held on June 17th and 18th. Pieces of artwork will be installed along the trail and the first piece installed will be a statue of Tecumseh. A schedule of events will be provided.

SERPENT MOUND: Serpent Mound has it's Summer Solstice – June 20th-21st and the Shawnee tribes have been invited to present programs. One of the clans of the Shawnee Tribe is the Serpent.

EASTER EGG HUNT: This Easter Egg Hunt will be held on Saturday at 10:00 a.m. and we are expecting 1000 attendees.

AOA OPENING: The AOA opened on April 4th. Currently we are experiencing more pick-ups than people eating inside. Approximately 20 is the maximum number staying to eat daily but there were about 50 people there today for their Easter dinner.

ELDERS DINNER: This dinner will be held Friday, April 29th at 5:30 p.m. The oldest male and female will be honored at this dinner.

BANK DIVIDEND: \$266,494.00 has been paid through the bank dividend

and placed in the Social Services Reserve. Our goal was for our Social Services Reserve to be \$20M. We now have \$20,391,349.00 in the Social Services Reserve and \$2,000,000.00 in the Education Reserve.

110 ROAD PROGRESS: This road will provide a second entrance/exit to the Housing Complex. The process of planning the road has begun. 30% of the design has been submitted for the 110 Road and we are hoping to have the design phase of it finished by July 15th. OKLAHOMA PERMIT APPROVAL FOR WATER/SEWER: We needed permits from Oklahoma and Missouri. Permits have been approved and the checks have been cut. We are waiting for Oklahoma to say they have received the check and work can be started.

PROPHET PROPERTY FINALIZED (Lot 102): Twenty-four acres that we purchased on State Line Rd. Part of this land was donated. and part purchased. We have now received all finalized papers.

TRIBAL ECONOMIC DEVELOP-MENT CONFERENCE: We had a Tribal Economic Conference that was scheduled in Miami, Oklahoma. This included the 9 tribes plus the Cherokees. This conference has been cancelled and will be rescheduled for the fall.

WOODLANDS FHLB PROPOSAL: The Woodlands are the duplexes that we have for Elders. We have two duplexes there with two units each that could allow four different families to live in the two units. These duplexes were done under the FHLB and they paid \$160,000 towards that construction of these duplexes. Chief Wallace proposed that this be paid off. The requirements of FHLB to live in these units make it very hard for us to find tenants that qualify to live in them. If we were not in the FHLB we would not have to go through this process. In the budget this year we have \$510,000 for Woodlands Housing not associated with Housing Authority. In the 3 years

that we have had these FHLB units we have received \$35, 458.00 in rental income. Of this \$510,000, \$150,000 is set aside and Chief Wallace is proposing that we take the \$150,000 and add \$10,000.00 more and pay off this FHLB. There would not be a negative impact on the budget and would no longer require the complicated reports that are due each year.

FOOD DISTRIBUTION LOCATION: The Red Barn has been completed. The food distribution location will be moved to the Red Barn. The next food distribution will be Thursday, April 28th at 10:00 a.m. – 1:30p.m.

SUMMER YOUTH: This is a summer youth program where we employ our tribal youth ages 16-22. The program begins at the end of their school session and ends at the beginning of their fall term. The pay will be \$13.00/hour with a 40- hour work week. Application will need to be made by the youth interested. To apply contact Kendra Stuart, Human Resources.

a place where people care about them, a place that gives them a hand up as opposed to a handout. That's our HAVEN program and that's why we need the tiny homes. Two construction workers have been beset by every difficulty imagined. Supply chain difficulties every time they turned around, delays in work schedules because of sub-contractors not being able to work because of their employees having COVID, losing a full month of work because of our construction guys having COVID themselves, necessity of delaying certain job tasks due to rain or too cold of temperatures or trying to spray paint the houses with gusts of wind 50-60 miles per hour, then having to stop and reschedule causing other rescheduling delays because of the obstacles encountered by the previous subcontractors, inability to move the tiny homes ourselves, then having to replace the already done plumbing which had to be removed to move the homes. You name the difficulty and it seemed our construction guys experienced it. But, we knew the need was real, we knew people were suffering, needing those homes and our construction workers never gave up. We are now finishing the construction process, ready to begin the healing process. Thanks to both our construction employees and to our HAVEN employees for keeping the faith, for all the things they do.

We have a new vacancy on our Housing Authority Board. If you would like to be involved in building these new homes, making plans for additional housing in the future, this just might be the opportunity you have been waiting for. Contact me either by email or phone to express your interest.

If you live locally, have a high school student who is 15 or 16 and is needing to take Drivers Education, then you need to contact Roudy Rogers or Jeanette Kruse of our Police Department right away to sign them up for the free Drivers Education Class. Tribal citizen Chad Ross and high school employee of Fairland High School is the instructor. Class size will be limited to 20 students and classes will begin Monday, May 23 at the Eastern Shawnee Police Department. To expand upon this information, our tribal dividend this year was \$266,494.00. This dividend was placed in our Social Services Reserve Account. A few years back a goal was set to earmark a Social Services Reserve account which would ensure payment of 2-3 years tribal benefits to tribal citizens in case hard times or a disaster occurred at the tribe. The goal was to build that reserve to 20 million. The addition of this year's bank dividend marks a total of \$20,391,349 dollars now in that reserve account, plus an additional 2 million earmarked for education. WOW! Goal reached and surpassed! These last two years we experienced such a disaster in the form of an impossible-to-predict-or-prepare-for catastrophe known as COVID-19, but fortunately we did not have to dip into this reserve. That initial investment of a total of just over \$1.5 million now has a book value exceeding 14 million. Additionally the dividends received over the bank's life exceed the price paid for the bank, DOUBLE WOW!

And I can't end this update without wishing a HAPPY MOTHERS DAY to all our mothers in our tribe. You are so very important. Enjoy your special day. 
